OVERVIEW

Alaska is under attack – In 2023, opioids killed a record number of Alaskans. Drug overdose deaths, the vast majority of which were fentanyl related, increased by more than 40 percent according to preliminary data, indicating Alaska experienced the largest percent increase of any state between 2022 and 2023. Across America, fentanyl is now the leading cause of death for young adults aged 18-45, according to Families Against Fentanyl.

"One Pill Can Kill - Alaska" is a statewide fentanyl awareness campaign led by U.S. Senator Dan Sullivan. This toolkit has been designed to help all Alaskans join the fight. Anybody can help spread the word. As Alaskans have proved time and time again, when we come together, there is nothing we can't accomplish.

This campaign will examine where fentanyl is coming from, where and how it is being sold, the dangers of the drug, how it impacts our Alaska communities, and the resources that are available for treatment, prevention, and reporting criminal activity.

To the right is a sample script for public figures, elected and community leaders, and everyday Alaskans who would like to record a public service announcement (PSA) that can be shared on local TV and radio outlets in your area.

"Did you know that in 2023, more Alaskans died of drug overdoses than ever previously recorded?

Fentanyl-related deaths are surging in Alaska.

Alaska is under attack. Our fellow Alaskans deserve to know where these drugs are coming from and how to protect our loved ones.

A single deadly dose of fentanyl fits on the tip of a pencil.

Just one pill can kill.

Never trust your own eyes to determine if a pill is legitimate. The only safe medications are ones prescribed by a trusted medical professional and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist.

7 out of every 10 pills seized by the DEA contain a lethal dose of fentanyl. There are important resources out there that can help you protect your loved ones and local community. Start by going to "dea.gov/onepill"

It's important that we all work together, as Alaskans and as Americans, to turn the tide and save lives.

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FACT SHEET

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What is fentanyl?

The drug landscape is dramatically different from even just a few years ago. Fentanyl is a deadly synthetic opioid that is 50 times more potent than heroin. According to CDC, preliminary data indicates that Alaska experienced the largest percent increase in drug overdose deaths of any state between 2022 and 2023, and that **fentanyl-related overdose deaths among Alaskans increased by nearly 75 percent**.

What are fake pills?

Cartels are manufacturing fentanyl and pressing it into fake pills. Fake pills are made to look like candy, Xanax, Adderall, and other pharmaceuticals. DEA lab testing reveals 6 out of every 10 fake pills with fentanyl



contain a lethal dose. Each pill contains a different amount of fentanyl—even just HALF a pill can kill.

How is fentanyl being distributed?


Drug traffickers are using social media to advertise and sell drugs. If you have a smartphone and a social media account, then a drug trafficker can find you. Ads for particular drugs are associated with specific emoji icon combinations.

What are the effects of fentanyl?

Fentanyl use can cause confusion, drowsiness, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, changes in pupil size, cold and clammy skin, coma, and respiratory failure leading to death.

Tips and key points for caregivers

- 1. Encourage open & honest communication.
- 2. Explain what fentanyl is and why it is so dangerous.
- 3. Stress never to take any pills not prescribed for you by your doctor.
- 4. No pill purchased on social media is safe.
- 5. Fentanyl is found in most illegal drugs.
- Help your loved one create an "exit plan" so they're prepared if ever pressured to use drugs.
